

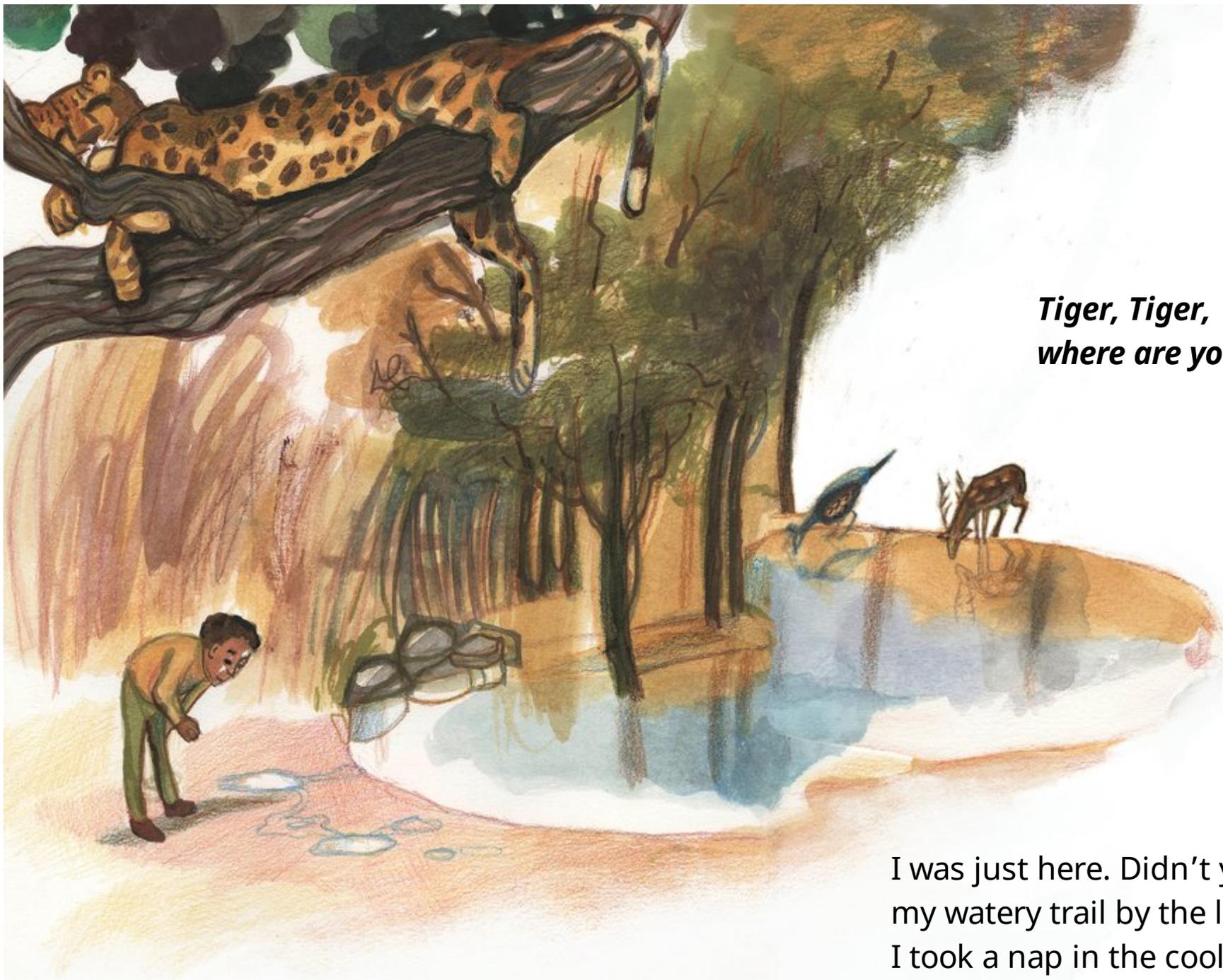


Tiger, Tiger, Where Are You?

where are you?***

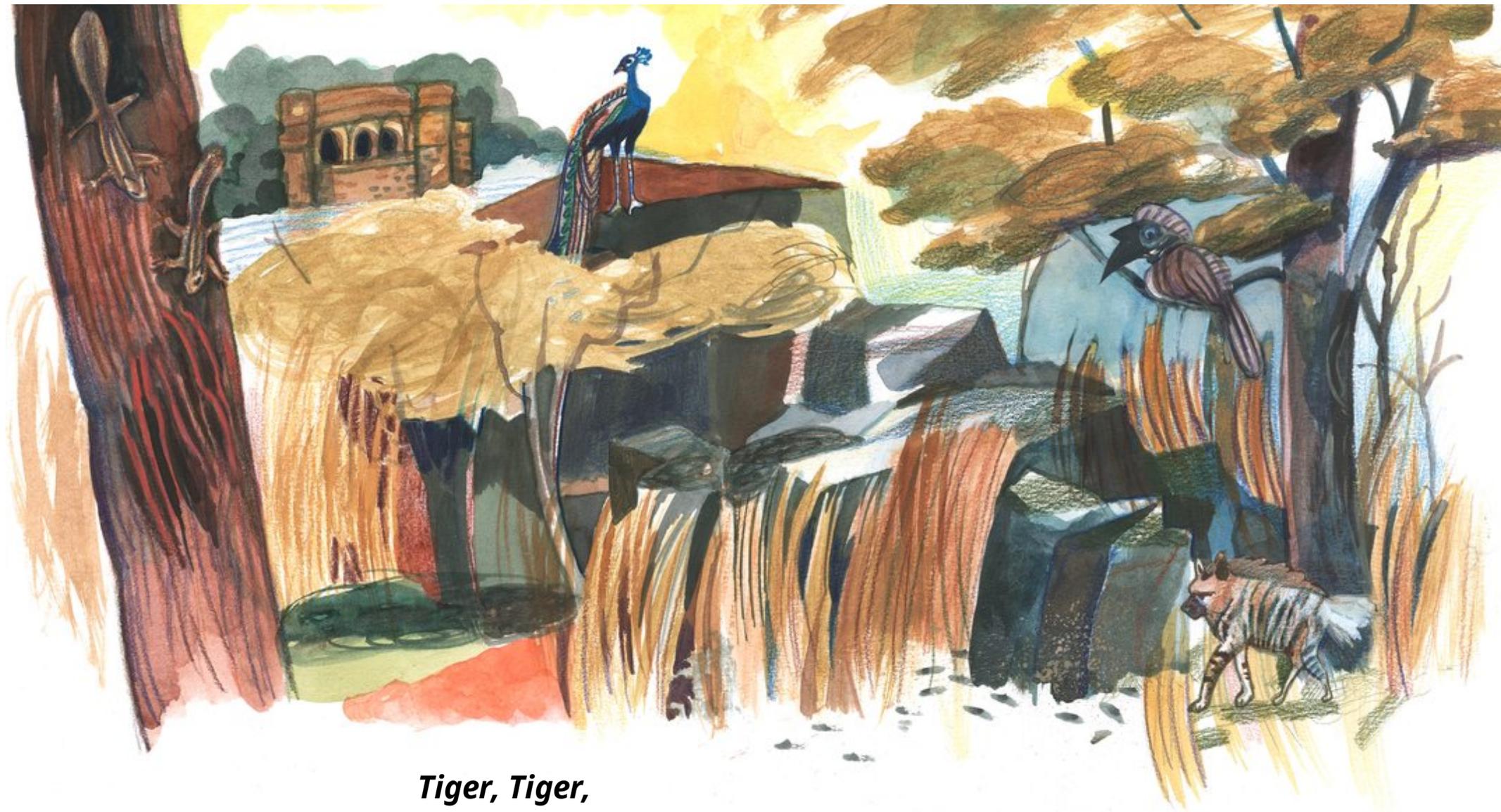
I was just here. Didn't you

I was sharpening my claws.



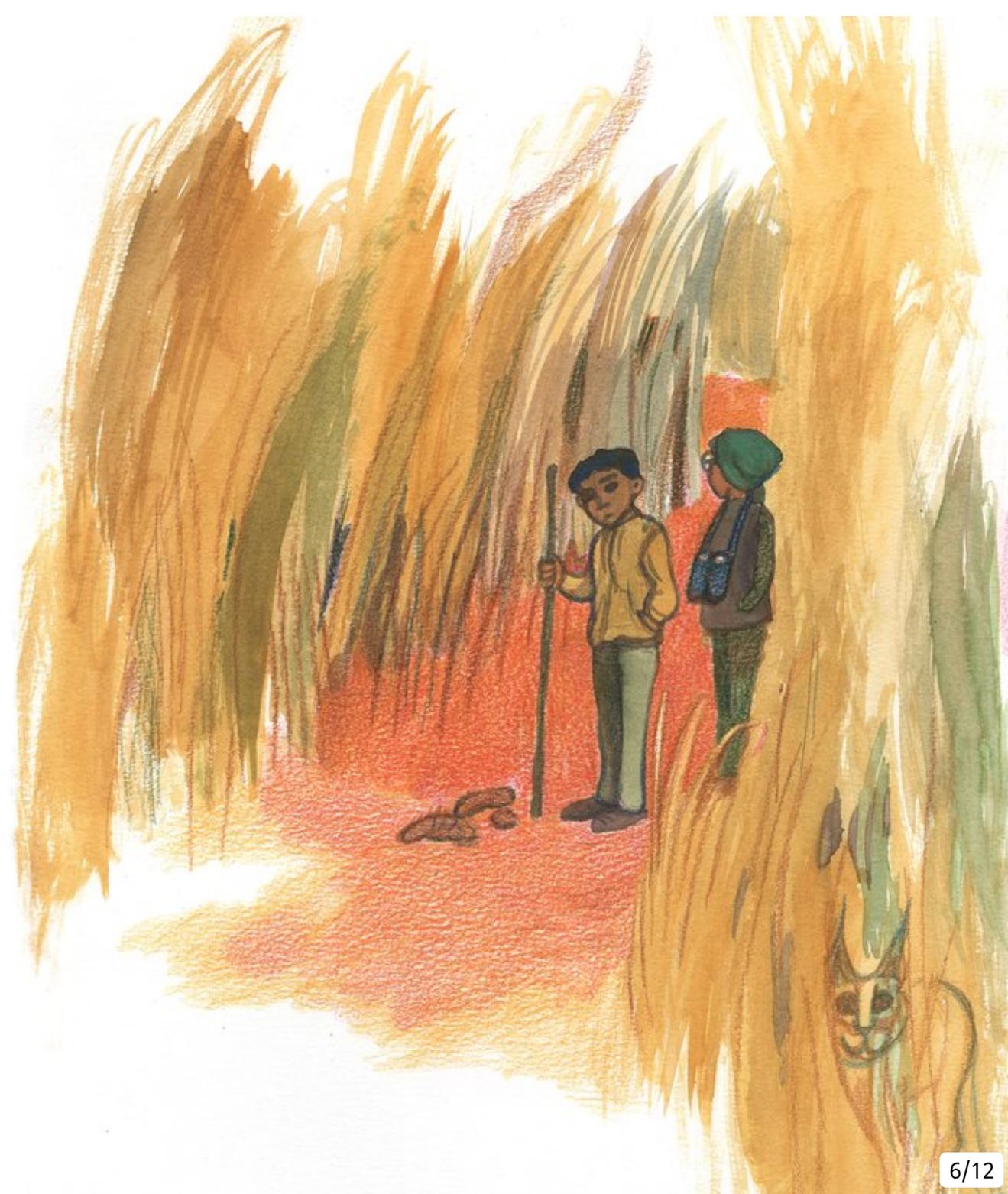
***Tiger, Tiger,

The spray helps a tigress find me!

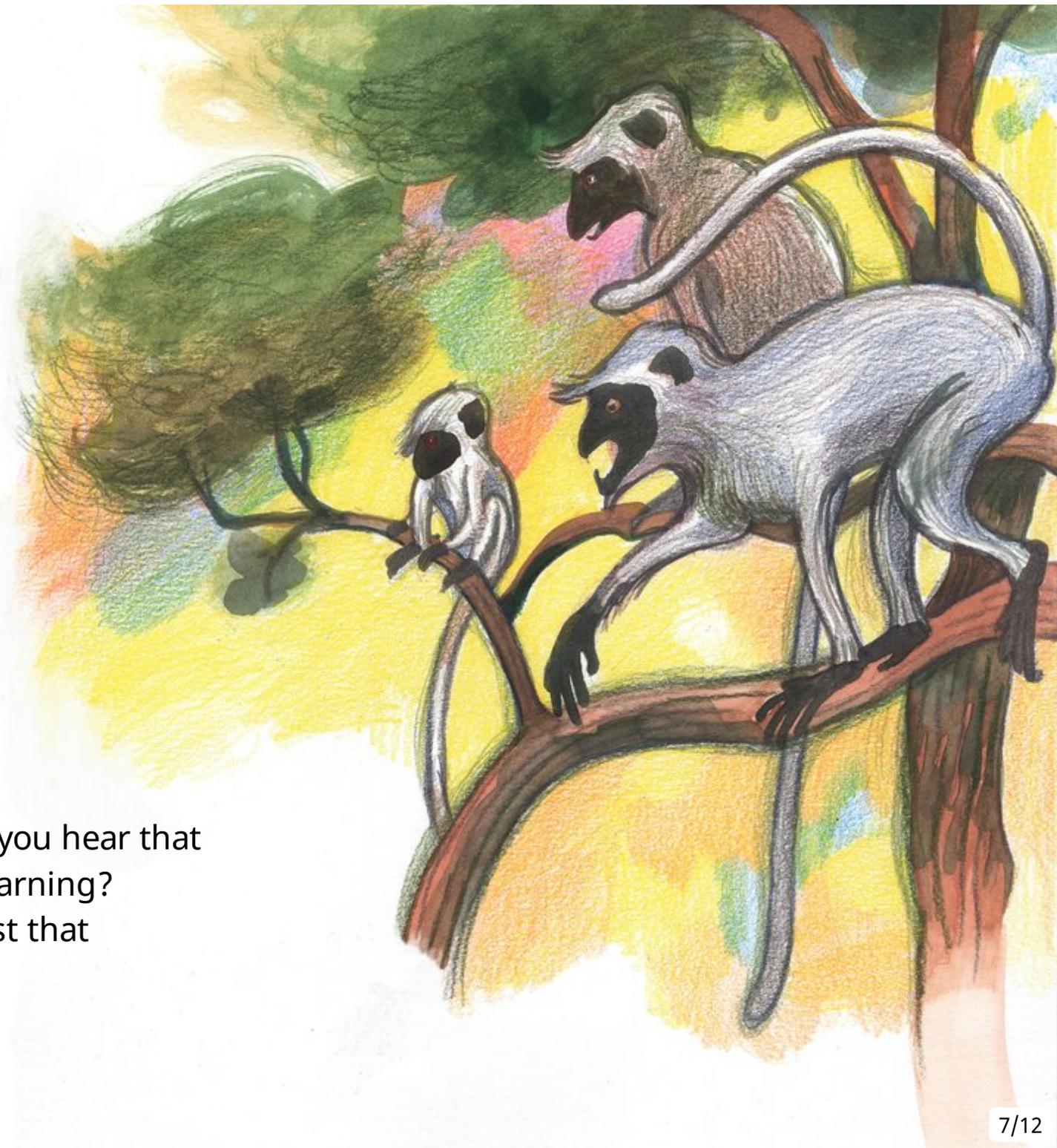
***Tiger, Tiger,

should give you a clue.



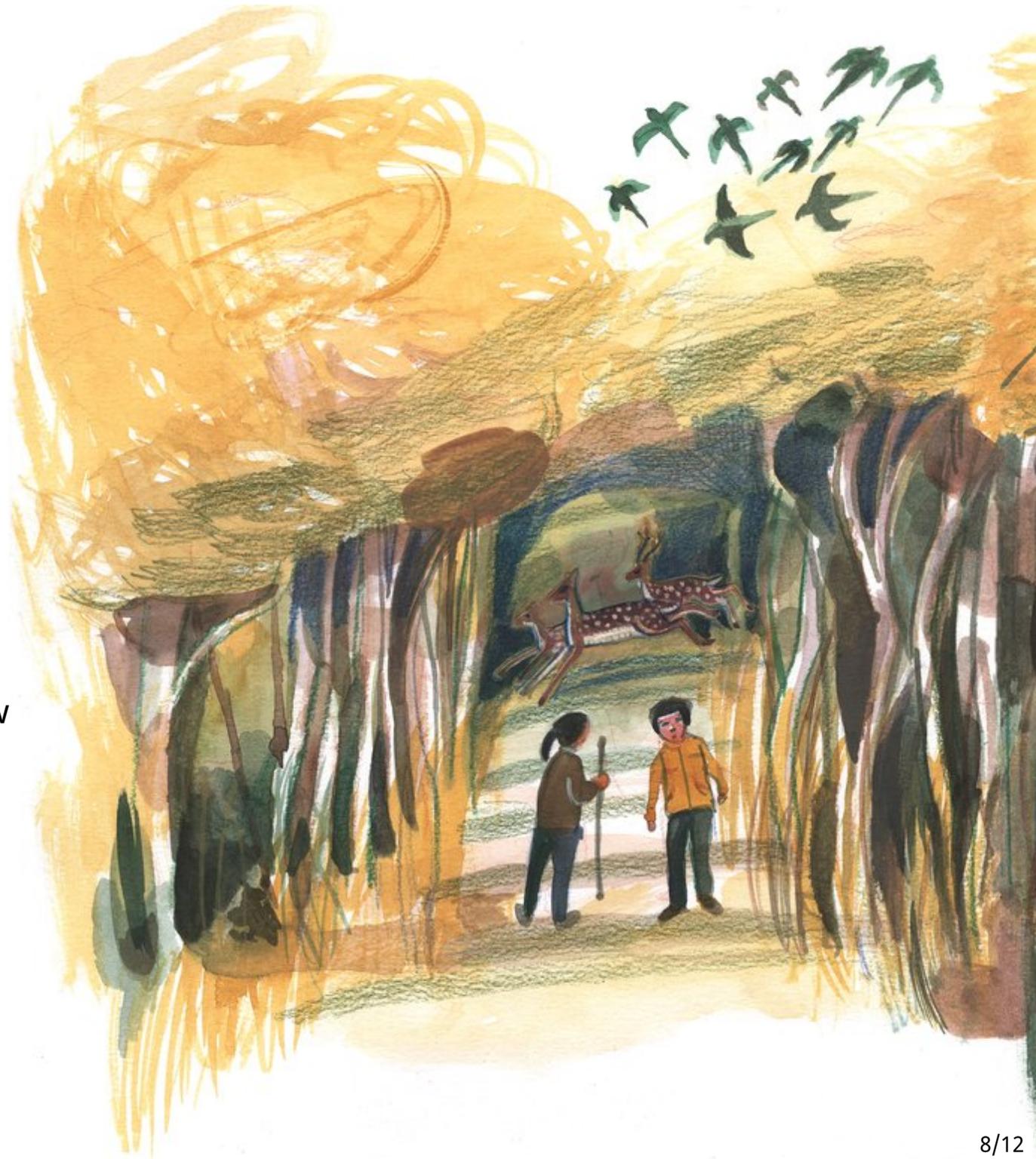
***Tiger, Tiger,

where are you?***

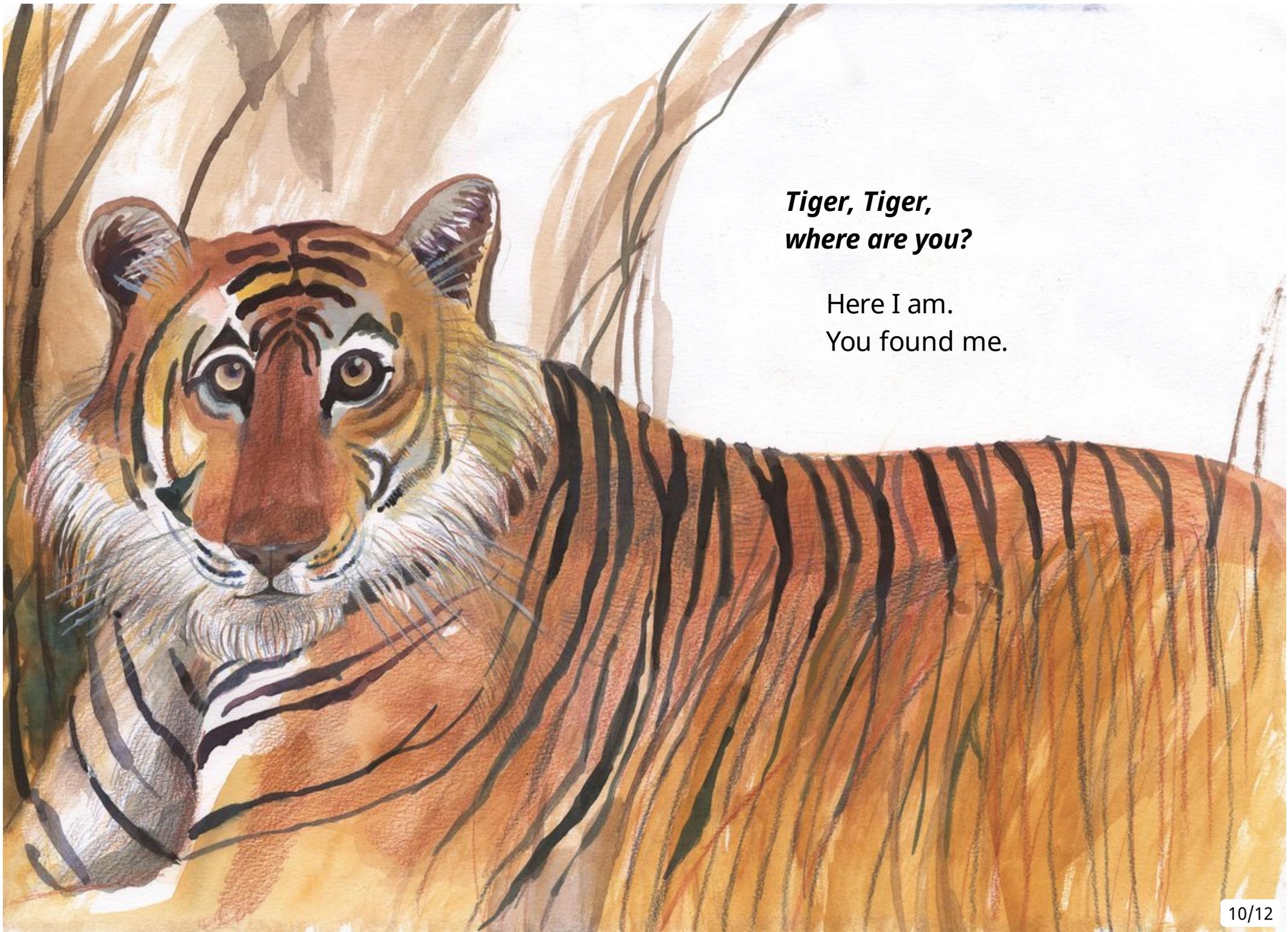
I was just here. Didn't you
